In March 2020, with the 30th Annual Jericho High School Alumni Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony less than four weeks away, a funny thing happened: The world shut down and hung up a “Gone Fishin” sign.

With the dinner over, everyone hopped in their cars and revved their engines for the drag race up Jericho Turnpike to the Jericho Public Library. (It's an annual tradition; you don't need to know anything further. Leave it alone, Kapish?)

Each inductee is introduced by a current Jericho star student who is considering possibly entering a similar field. They speak on the phone beforehand and meet the morning of the event, when the inductees come to the high school to speak to the kids in various classrooms. The Jericho alumni and the soon-to-be grads introducing them typically develop a strong connection.

At left, senior **Sachi Sethi** takes the podium to introduce the first inductee of the evening, **Gail Abbott Zimmerman**,



TV producer and news director **Gail Abbott Zimmerman**, winner of three Emmy Awards, entered television at a time when there were relatively few women in the field. The late sportscaster **Howard Cosell**, famous for his on-air bloviating, was both incredulous and none too pleased the first time he learned that he'd be recording a sports segment with a female producer.

The 1969 Jericho grad went on to become a longtime producer and senior producer for the popular program *48 Hours*. She also worked at ABC-TV's *20/20*, directed four Olympics Games, *Dick Clark's New Year's Rockin' Eve*, as well as several soap operas. Her wry sense of humor and story-telling had the entire audience laughing.



(Right) JHS Senior **Sara Chan** introduced the first member of the JHS Alumni Hall of Fame to have graduated in the twenty-first century, the class of 2002's **Erica Ross**.

From Jericho, Erica went to Yale University, graduating magnum cum laude in 2006. Then she headed out to the West Coast, to the Stanford University School of Law, where she edited the prestigious *Stanford Law Review*.

Erica clerked for Supreme Court Justice Elena Kagan in 2011 and 2012 and is currently as assistant to the solicitor general of the United States, She has argued a number of cases before the Supreme Court. She lives on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC, with her husband **Chad Golder**, a former US deputy associate attorney general who clerked for the retiring Justice John Paul Stevens. Their adorable daughter, **Sydney**, voiced her enthusiasm throughout Mom's speech, cracking up the crowd.

Between Erica and her husband, surely at least one of them could tell us whether the nine justices wear clothes beneath their robes. But we suspect they're probably too discreet to spill the beans.





Each year, the **Jericho Retirees Association** presents a Community Service Award to a deserving organization with a tie to Jericho. The monetary award is named after the late **Emil Voigt**, a force of nature as a passionate social studies teacher and president of the teachers union.



This year's award went to **Jericho Cares** president **Fran O'Connor**, who has lived in Jericho for ten years and has two daughters attending district schools. (Her husband graduated from JHS, making her a Jawhawk-by-proxy.) The grassroots nonprofit was established in August 2020, in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic. JC provides necessities to needy local families (and, yes, they exist, even in Jericho). From its website: "We deliver custom boxes to families and individuals that reach out for assistance. We deliver donations ranging from socks to comforters, dishes to pet food, cereal to toiletries. We are building a network where local residents can fulfill the needs of these families within days."

Pranav Dendukuri, another impressive JHS senior, introduced **Dr. Andrew Greenberg** from the class of 1973.

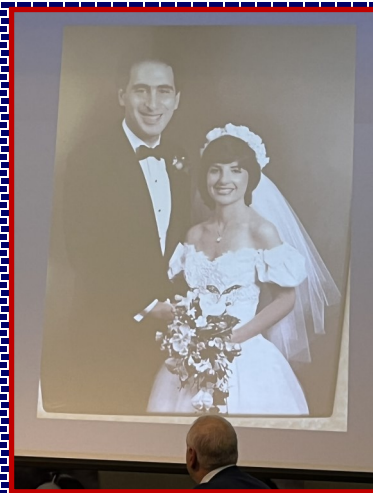


Dr. Greenberg, director of the Obesity and Metabolism Laboratory at Tufts University in Boston, has published well over 120 scientific papers. His

research into the origins of obesity led to the discovery of an human protein that regulates fat storage. Andrew named it perilipin. Too much or too little perilipin can bring about serious health problems.

Andy earned extra credit by presenting a slide show. Because he is extremely tall, at Jericho he played on the basketball team. (That's him in the back row, towering over his teammates.) He and his wife have two grown daughters and live in Newton, Massachusetts.

Senior **Jacob Crossman** introduced Nevada assembly-woman **Ellen Barre Spiegel** from the JHS class of 1980.



One of the people that Ellen thanked from the stage was in the audience: **Ellen Siber** (JHS '69). The two met in 1976, when Ellen B. (here we go again) joined a temple youth group led by Ellen S., a high school teacher for thirty-four years.

Says Ellen S. of the new Hall of Famer: "Ellen demonstrated natural leadership skills even then. She was unusually mature, calm, and insightful, and had the natural ability to lead and be inclusive with her peers. I knew then that she would do great things—and she is."

After graduating Cornell University, Ellen worked at American Express, Prodigy, and the Weather Channel. Then in 1995 she moved to Los Angeles, where she met her husband, Bill, a fellow transplanted New Yorker. The couple relocated to the Las Vegas area. Ellen founded a workers' compensation consulting firm. Always civic minded, she was elected to the Nevada State Legislation in 2012 and is currently running as the Democratic candidate for state controller.

Senior **Matthew Ingber** introduced the fifth and final HoF inductee for 2022: clinical psychologist **Pam Wasserman-Heath** (1985).

Pam was nominated by her twin sister, **Ellyn**, who wrote touchingly of her: "Although my nomination could pertain to Pam's skills as a psychologist, it is not. My sister is very much dedicated to giving back to where we first began." Pam is a member of the Jericho Board of Ed and has been president of the Jackson School PTA. "She is warm, thoughtful, and compassionate," Ellyn continued. "People are drawn to her and feel comfortable reaching out to her. In turn, she gains their confidence and becomes a voice for many. She takes tremendous pride in her roles in her community, and I admire her tremendously."

As Pam recalled from the stage, in high school the two used to sometimes swap identities for fun. Pam would impersonate Ellyn in one of her classes, and Ellyn would do the same. The practice ended abruptly after Ellyn sat in for Pam in a class she knew little about—and the teacher ambushed everyone with a surprise quiz.
