However, after long and careful consideration of the nature of the balloting, the rules of the contest,

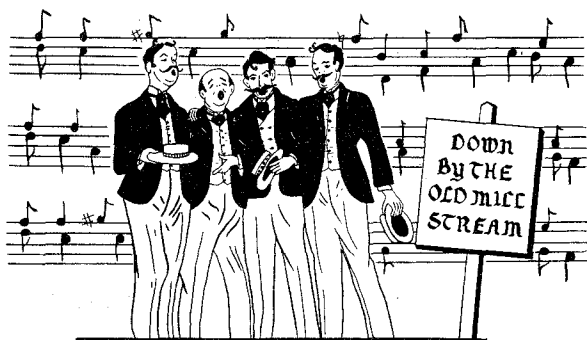

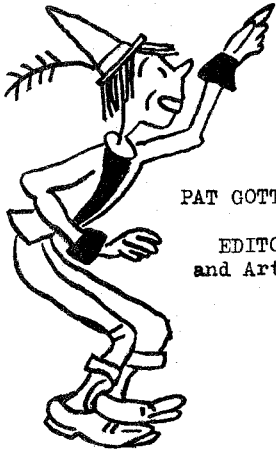

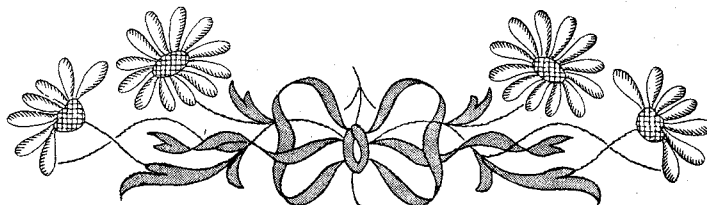
